

## **28<sup>TH</sup> SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME**

Today is the 28<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time. It begins a period of reflection on the meaning of “riches” for individuals and communities. We read a love song to the spirit of wisdom. The Psalm and Hebrews both continue this meditation on wisdom and the Word of God. Mark personalizes these reflections by the story of a good man who wants only to move closer to eternal life, but finds his way blocked by his own success. He walks away sadly from Jesus.

The choice could not be clearer, but even a good man, recognized as such by Jesus, finds it impossible to uproot himself from his possessions. The lesson is both about the treasure that is Wisdom — eternal life, that is Jesus — and the power of our attachment to things that are not eternal. We must choose again and again which path we will make our own.

### **SPIRIT OF WISDOM**

The first reading is about wisdom. It is a love poem written to the object of the author’s desire. The author loves wisdom itself and experiences wisdom as the source of all good things, all riches. The psalm tells us that wisdom is kindness. It is knowing and doing the work of God. It is understanding what our life is for. The second reading from Hebrews recognizes that Wisdom is, in fact, the Word of God, Jesus. The source of our continuing life is Jesus. Mark makes this even more personal with the story of one man. A good man who has observed the laws from his youth, even in the loving presence of Jesus, cannot find the strength to leave his worldly possession behind and follow.

### **LETTING GO**

Who does not strive to be successful? What good person does not want to be able to provide for their family all the necessities of life, to assure that they will have the means to feed, clothe, shelter, educate, and care for themselves and those they love as well as help their neighbors, strangers, the needy? Isn’t that what is asked of us, to love God and our neighbor as ourselves? The readings today make clear that even more is required of us. We must do all those things and we must realize that doing so is only the first step to understanding what is at the center of our lives. We must realize that our accomplishments are not the measure of our value and worth. However successful or unsuccessful we are, our worth is measured by the truth that Jesus suffered, died, and rose for us. To truly know that, we must let go of everything else that roots us in time, space, and expectation and be willing to follow eternity.

For they should call us to profound gratitude for all that God has done for us and inspire us to live lives of thanksgiving and obedience to Him in response to His overwhelming love and mercy.

## Pastor's Pulpit

WHO YOU GOING TO CALL . . .

### THE ANGEL FRED?

I began my homily with the question, "Do you believe in dreams?" I mean the kind that you enter into when sleeping and the kind that wake you up wondering if that was real or not? Maybe it was the result of what you may have eaten the night before."

The night before I was to celebrate the First Friday School Mass for the last time as pastor, I dreamed what I was to say to the students of our school as well as the faculty and parents that would be present. It would be my last homily to the school as Pastor with my retirement the end of this month and I wanted it to memorable.

Earlier that week, we had celebrated the feast day of the Guardian Angels. I wondered about St. Michael The Archangel, and what he might suggest I say to the children. However, Michael was busy, it seems, with the whole world praying to him at the request of Pope Francis. Lately, Michael The Archangel has been busy big time!

It seems that my dream was relegated to another angel who I discovered was called the Angel Fred. It might have had to do with something I read several years ago about an Angel Fred and how he was originally chosen to announce the good news to the Blessed Mother, but somehow got sidetracked and the Archangel Gabriel got the call. And there I was...left with the Angel Fred.

In my dream that night, Fred asked that I call him Fred and not Angel and wanted to know what I wanted from him. Basically, I asked if he could help me with a message to the school children. No problem, was his quick response. Maybe too quick a response, I thought. What's the worst thing that could happen? I'd probably wake up.

Well I told Fred that I wanted to share with the students a simple mes-

sage of God's love for them. He suggested a couple things I might consider, granted now this is Fred and not The Archangel Michael. Fred suggested that I write a simple message on a sheet of paper (I suggested I type it and he agreed). The message was this: **"JESUS LOVES YOU."**

Fred also suggested I place the message in an envelope and put it somewhere special. The altar came to mind, but Fred suggested something even better. Place the message near the Tabernacle.

During the homily I told the story of Fred and I think I had the children's' attention for a few minutes. I men-

tioned the special message from Angel Fred and that he asked me to leave it in the most special place in Church. I asked the students where they thought that might be and one suggested the altar. (Great minds think alike.)

I thanked the student and said there was an even more special spot. Another student suggested the Tabernacle. I sensed that I had their attention. I went over to the Tabernacle, picked up the envelope and said it was a very special message from the "Big Man" and I need to read it to them.

By now I think they were all on to me and I read the message. **"JESUS LOVES YOU."** I presented that message to the newly appointed President of the Student Council with the challenge that he shares it throughout his time in Office. He agreed.

This was a message to the school children, but it is a message we can all take to heart during these difficult times. We all need to remember that Jesus does indeed love us. We need to remember that it is the Church of Jesus Christ and that Christ will never abandon His Church. And knowing that the gates of Hell will never prevail against His Church as Christ told St. Peter.

Saint Michael the Archangel, thanks for sending Fred. Nothing against the Angel Fred, but I believe we will be reciting St. Michael's prayer a lot. I don't think Fred has a prayer yet, but he certainly came through in a pinch. And don't forget to thank your Guardian Angel daily for helping you on your way to meeting Jesus.

## HOW CHRISTIANS CAN REBUILD OUR CULTURE<sup>1</sup>

"We often hear the claim that we shouldn't press for laws that impose our morality on others. But no one really believes that kind of argument because it makes no sense. In practice, *all* law involves imposing certain moral claims on other people. Persons who support permissive abortion or same-sex unions, for example, are very comfortable in coercing the public through the courts and lawmaking process. As Christians we should be equally comfortable—and even more zealous—in defending the human person and advancing human dignity through legislative and judicial means. That said...if we try to give everything that's morally good the force of the law, people will sooner or later start to think that whatever is legal is also moral. In other words, laws can't solve all our moral problems."

## INVESTIGATION STARTED...

### HOPEFUL, BUT VIGILANT



In an article published early last week titled "There are Hopeful Signs from Rome, But Stay Vigilant," Msgr. Charles Pope from Washington, DC, encouraged Catholics to "...stay angry at sin and corruption – but let your anger take the form of holy perseverance, not unholy bitterness."<sup>1</sup>

Msgr. Pope reported on a Vatican communique issued on Oct 6 where Pope Francis said:

*After the publication of the accusations regarding the conduct of Archbishop Theodore Edgar McCarrick, the Holy Father Pope Francis, aware of and concerned by the confusion that these accusations are causing in the conscience of the faithful, has established that the following be communicated:*

*... The Holy Father ordered a thorough preliminary investigation ... which was carried out by the Archdiocese of New York, at the conclusion of which the relative documentation was forwarded to the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith. ...*

*Moreover ... the Holy Father has decided that information gathered during the preliminary investigation be combined with a further thorough study of the en-*

*tire documentation present in the Archives of the Dicasteries and Offices of the Holy See regarding the former Cardinal McCarrick, in order to ascertain all the relevant facts, to place them in their historical context and to evaluate them objectively.*

*The Holy See is conscious that, from the examination of the facts and of the circumstances, it may emerge that choices were taken that would not be consonant with a contemporary approach to such issues. However, as Pope Francis has said: "We will follow the path of truth wherever it may lead" (Philadelphia, Sept. 27 2015). Both abuse and its cover-up can no longer be tolerated and a different treatment for Bishops who have committed or covered up abuse, in fact represents a form of clericalism that is no longer acceptable.*

*... As previously made known, the Holy Father has convened a meeting of the Presidents of the Bishops' Conferences from around the world for next February, while the words of his recent Letter to the People of God still resonate: "The only way that we have to respond to this evil that has darkened so many lives is to experience it as a task regarding all of us as the People of God ..." (Aug. 20, 2018).<sup>2</sup>*

Msgr. Pope commented, "Stay strong, persistent, faithful and properly angry, fellow Catholics. Although it is a step in the right direction, one communique cannot solve this mess. Affirm it, but continue to demand action. Insist that the communique be a true path forward both to the November meeting of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) and the February meeting of Presidents of the Bishops' Conferences called by the Pope."



This sandstone statue on the Charles Bridge was created by Josef Max in 1853 and given to the city by Abbot Jeronym Zeidler from the Norbertine Strahov Monastery. This is the third statuery of St. Norbert with the other two destroyed during war and lost.
