# NATIVITY OF JOHN THE BAPTIST

God loves infinite variety. God creates every human person as an unrepeatable being, each with a distinct purpose in life. Today, on the feast of John the Baptist, we praise God for creating this one-of-a-kind powerhouse prophet and preacher. Maybe some of us share personality traits with John the Baptist. Or maybe we couldn't be more unlike him. God will use whatever gifts we have, bold or discreet. God wants salvation to "reach to the ends of the earth," as today's reading from Isaiah says, so we can all find a way to serve the Lord. Nothing less than the salvation of the world is at stake; we have received the "word of salvation," Saint Paul says in the Acts of the Apostles. Today's feast is a perfect time to ask the Lord what gifts we have, and how we can use them to share the love of Jesus.

## RIPE AND READY


Teachers and coaches know how to modify their tactics to reach various learners. God does the same with us, perfectly assessing the precise intervention we need in particular situations. God sent Jesus into the world at the ripest moment in human history. Although plenty of prophets, for centuries, had foretold the coming of the Messiah, the profound honor of meeting Christ himself fell to John the Baptist. The Gospel of Matthew tells us what this blessed prophet was like: "John wore clothing made of camel's hair and had a leather belt around his waist. His food was locusts and wild honey." Out of an infinite variety of people throughout all of human history, God chose John the Baptist, in his wildness, to make us ready to meet the Son of God.

## LEAST LIKELY TO SUCCEED

Few, if any, of us would be likely to choose John the Baptist as the one to prepare the world to meet its savior. Most of us would feel awkward around John, given his food and clothing choices, and his constant reminders to repent of our sins. John's own father, Zechariah, doubted God's providence when he learned his wife Elizabeth would give birth to John. As a punishment, the angel Gabriel removed Zechariah's ability to speak. Luke's Gospel reading today recounts the moment when Zechariah acknowledges God's plan for his son. He supports Elizabeth — who had trusted in God's providence all along — and regains his voice. Zechariah rejoices in God's wisdom, praising God to all their neighbors. John's story reminds us how our instincts often run counter to God's wisdom. Though we avoid awkward and difficult people, God chooses a locust-eating man to show us the way to Jesus. The lesson of John the Baptist is never to underestimate the power and wisdom of God. This inspires hope! We, like John, are "fearfully, wonderfully made" (Psalm 139). God has beautiful plans for each of us.

## Who Do You Trust?

Today is the Solemnity of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist (the Feast Day of the birth of John the Baptist).

To say John the Baptist and Jesus were closely related and connected is an understatement.

Both were foretold by prophets, especially Isaiah. The only record of the birth of John the Baptist appears in the Gospel of Luke and it is at the heart of our Gospel Reading today.

A key player in this event is, of course, John the Baptist's father Zechariah. Zechariah was a Jewish priest, but when the Archangel Gabriel revealed to him that he would father a child, Zechariah refused to believe it. As a result he was rendered speechless until John was born.

Zechariah had total trust in the Lord, however. Although it was traditional at that time to name the first son after the father, he and Elizabeth



had been told that they were to name him John. As reported in the Gospel, Elizabeth said "He will be called John." The family protested at which time Zechariah wrote "His name is John." When he did that, Zechariah could

speak once more. He did not say "should be;" he said "is."

The trust shown by Zechariah is an example to us that we must trust in God, not just when it is convenient, but all the time. Those of advanced generations know who Lawrence Welk was. Born and raised Catholic, Welk practiced his faith throughout his life. He once said, "Never trust anyone completely but God. Love people, but put your full trust only in God." © catholicsteward.com

# Journey to Holiness

**BEYOND THE FIRST ENCOUNTER. . .**

## ONE STEP AT A TIME

“Discipleship is a life-long journey of ever deeper intimacy with Jesus,” said Archbishop Samuel Aquila of Denver when asked about the meaning and importance of discipleship for the Archdiocese of Denver.<sup>1</sup>

“To be a disciple is not something that happens in a single instant, [something] that is done and over with. In fact, it’s the opposite. Like any friendship it grows continually through the conversion of the heart and mind to be more like Jesus. . . . As St. Paul wrote to the Christians of Corinth, ‘the love of Christ impels us,’” he said.

How does one become a disciple of Jesus? According to Archbishop Aquila, “When one thinks of the importance of this mission and of how we spend years training for our various professions, it makes sense that becoming a missionary disciple is a gradual and life-long process.”

“Christ spent three years forming the 12 Apostles. He taught them by his example, sent them out on short missions, had them experience his death and resurrection, and finally, sent them the Holy Spirit. Only after this period of formation did he give them the mission to carry the Gospel to the ends of the earth.<sup>2</sup>

What are the steps to discipleship, becoming fervent disciples?

- 1) **Prayer:** “The first component of helping others to become missionary disciples is to teach them to pray. Spending time in persona daily prayer with each Person of the Trinity is the necessary foundation for the life of every missionary disciple,” Archbishop Aquila said. There are many resources including daily reflections, Mass readings, Magnificat daily missal, weekly Sunday gospel reflection groups organized by parishes, Eucharistic Adoration and more.
- 2) **Share:** “[T]he second aspect of discipleship that is an indispensable companion to intellectual formation: the mentoring or modeling component. In the time of Christ, this handing on of a way of life – the art of Jewish living, so to speak – occurred through the rabbi-disciple relationship. The disciple would imitate the rabbi in everything, even down to how he walked, talked and dressed. The thought was that by imitating even the smallest details, the disci-

ple would acquire the rabbi’s virtues,” he said adding for us today, “...After a year or two in a Bible study and being mentored, rather than staying in the same small group, the person who is being ‘discipled’ is sent out to start a new Bible study group. Hence, there is continual growth in mission and bringing the Gospel to many more people. ...we are called to continually go out and bring others into the Gospel encounter.”

- 3) **Care:** “Practically speaking this means inviting the person to engage in works of charity with you, in sharing the Gospel with others, or in some kind of activity that helps build virtue or character. Any of us who have helped in soup kitchens...or have gone on mission trips to foreign countries, know the impact of those works of mercy that change our lives. It is important after these encounters to take the time to reflect on how they helped you experience an encounter with Christ in the love of your neighbor.”

- 4) **Dare:** “Pope Paul VI once described the final step in discipleship as, ‘The person who has been evangelized goes on to evangelize others.’<sup>3</sup> And any of you who have gone on a mission trip or evangelized someone else knows that the reverse is also true: that when we share the faith with others we are often evangelized by the very people we are seeking to evangelize,” Archbishop Aquila said adding, “...Every believer is called to become a disciple who is spiritually fruitful. For

some of you, God is calling you to focus solely on forming your children or other family members first, and for others of you he might be giving you a call to reach out to people you don’t even know.”

So, what does that mean to you sitting in the pews at St. Norbert Parish on this Nativity of John The Baptist Sunday? When you go to a great restaurant or see a good movie, what do you do? You tell your friends about it. You “evangelize” or “witness” for that encounter. “Forming lifelong Catholics occurs best through witnesses to the faith and living the faith in the world,” Archbishop Aquila noted.



# RECALL YOUR BAPTISM

It's midsummer day! We have the advantage of celebrating one of the great hidden treasures of our liturgical calendar on a Sunday this year. There are only three "nativity" feasts on our calendar: for the Lord, the Blessed Mother (September 8), and today's birth of the Baptist. Today's date is anchored by the Annunciation (March 25), when Mary learns not only of her own child's advent, but of Elizabeth's child. We are exactly half a year away from Christmas Eve. There are strong traditions around this feast. Just as the winter solstice provides a rich vocabulary for Christmas, so does the abundance of light at midsummer inform this celebration. Just as at Christmas, a religious festival spills over into culture. As summer light reaches its peak, the sun-drenched zones of



northern Europe see people staying up all night, lighting "St. John's fires" in the long summer twilight. Bonfires seem to be the unifying force in all these celebrations, kindled along the shores of the St. Lawrence River (pictured at left) in Quebec and Montreal, with harbor illuminations in France. You may be most interested in the custom in San Juan, Puerto Rico, the Baptist's own city. People there will leap into the sea between midnight and dawn to honor John. Why not find your way to a pool, a lake, or a sandy beach today and plunge in to recall your baptism? It's a tradition!


