

FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT

REPENTANCE

“We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God.” So says Paul in the Second Letter to the Corinthians. Isn’t this what Lent is all about? We know that we are sinners, yet we don’t think about it much. Lent is the time to think about all the ways in which we have failed to be all that we hope to be as followers of Christ. Like the prodigal son in the Gospel, we accept the gifts that God gives but forget the goodness of the giver. We waste our gifts on useless works and useless things. We can’t wait to get to the stores on “Black Friday.” We collect useless junk for our homes, our cars, and our children; things that don’t contribute to our good character, but only to our cluttered lives. We obsess over our phones, our computers, and our i-things at the expense of our face-to-face relationships.

FORGIVENESS

“So he got up and went back to his father. While he was still a long way off, his father caught sight of him, and was filled with compassion. He ran to his son, embraced him and kissed him.” To have seen his son a long way off, the father must have been looking for him, watching every day, hoping for his return. The father was ready to forgive, love, and receive back the son who wandered and squandered. And so our God is with us. God’s faithful love and compassion is always ready to forgive us, if only we would turn back to the right way again. As Saint Paul says, “God was reconciling the world to [God] in Christ, not counting their trespasses against them and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation.” In turn, we are to welcome others into this new freedom and joy. “So we are ambassadors for Christ, as if God were appealing through us.”

AMBASSADORS
FOR CHRIST

In our Second Reading from St. Paul's second letter to the Corinthians, Paul says, "So we are ambassadors for Christ, as if God were appealing through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God." There are two important points intended for us in those two sentences, especially during our Lenten journeys.

First, we are to be "ambassadors on behalf of Christ." Then, as now, an ambassador was one who represented a ruler, at that time most likely a king, in dealing with others.

Paul's meaning is that we are called to represent our King, the Lord, here and now in our dealings with others. We do things representing our Lord and Savior, and we need to recognize both that fact and the responsibility which goes with it.

It is what being a steward means —

The second sentence reminds us that we need to be reconciled with God. Note that it does not say that God is to be reconciled with us. The duty lies with us and needs to be precipitated by us.



PEACE AND CONCORD



Our “Jubilee Year of Mercy” and this period of Lent are times for all of us to seek the mercy and the forgiveness of God and of each other.

In my homily the week before last I challenged all, myself included, to take “the cell phone challenge.” I asked for all of you to consider taking your cell phone out (not during Mass and not while driving) and call someone you feel would

be in need of your call.

If you haven't done it yet, today would be a time to simply call a friend or a loved one and say hello or say I miss you or on a deeper level to say I am truly sorry for what I said or did to offend.

Recently, as I announced at this past weekend's Masses, we received a picture of our patron Saint Norbert. He is known in history as a defender of the Eucharist and a reconciler. In our Vision Prayer we pray that he as “minister of peace and concord” will pray for us all.

The picture given to us is a copy of a photo of the statue of St. Norbert at our Norbertine College in De Pere, Wis-

consin. It shows St. Norbert holding two olive branches in the form of a cross. I am not positive, but the artist may be Tony Visco the sculptor of the Prodigal Son statue that is in our prayer garden.

The St. Norbert picture will be hung in the Oratory outside the Confessional as a reminder of the peace and mercy that is offered in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.


In a book entitled, “*Norbert and Early Norbertine Spirituality*,”¹ Saint Norbert is seen under many titles. He is listed as: Norbert of Xanten, Archbishop of Magdeburg, preacher and reformer of religious life, and founder of monasteries. He also faced several attempts on his life, gave away his fortune to the poor along with his royal titles, begged barefoot, and at the end of his life was chancellor and adviser to the German Emperor. He was indeed an individual full of life and mission. The community that St. Norbert founded almost 900 years ago is called the Canons Regular of Premontre which is more familiar to us as Norbertines today. We here at St. Norbert Parish are part of that tradition.

May we all as members of St. Norbert Parish become ministers of peace and concord welcoming and praying for those who are in need of the Love of God.

That peace lies at the heart of Divine Mercy. It is the peace which Jesus won for all men and women on the cross. His Resurrection is the Father's public validation of Jesus' victory over sin and death. That is why Pope Saint John Paul II gave the Second Sunday of Easter the name “Divine Mercy Sunday.”

ANOTHER SEMINARIAN!

I am very happy to announce that St. Norbert Parish will be sending another seminarian to St. Charles Borromeo Seminary. Parishioner **Gabriel Fairorth** has been accepted by Archbishop Chaput to begin studies for the priesthood this coming Fall in the College division. Congratulations to Gabe, his parents Kathy and Steve, and his family. We are very happy for this blessing on him, his family and our parish.



St. Charles Seminary was established in 1832 by Reverend Francis Patrick Kenrick, third Bishop of Philadelphia, at his home on 5th Street in Center City. After four subsequent moves, St. Charles was settled at its present location in Overbrook in 1871.

The Seminary may be one of the best kept secrets in the Archdiocese. It occupies 75 acres on beautiful grounds, with a wonderful library including over 20,000 rare books dating as far back as the Middle Ages, and a fine arts collection of more than 750 pieces including paintings and sculpture.

This **Sunday** afternoon at **4 PM** is the **Annual Lenten Concert** by the seminarians: **Adoramus te, Christe: We Adore you, O Christ** in the Chapel of St. Martin of Tours. Before and after the concert from 1-4 and 6-8, beautiful artwork will be on display and for purchase in the Ryan Memorial Library. I encourage you to go online and check out the seminary at scs.edu.

The Lord is blessing us with vocations to religious life. Gabe will be joining one other seminarian from St. Norbert's along with two men in the diaconate program and another currently discerning and applying to be a deacon. ANOINTED BY THE HOLY SPIRIT TO GIVE . . .

THE AROMA OF CHRIST



Confirmation

Earlier this week, 107 of our youth were confirmed, receiving the gift of the Holy Spirit. This year, since our Confirmation day fell on the feast day of St. Katharine Drexel, Auxiliary Bishop John McIntyre used the readings of her memorial Mass to draw those being confirmed into those Gospel messages and how Confirmation calls us all to share in Christ's mission

to promote life and dignity as **priest, prophet and king**.

In the publication "*Confirmation: Strengthened by the Spirit, Called to Action*,"¹ our US Conference of Bishops calls us to, "...share Christ's **priestly** mission by giving of ourselves daily in union with Christ's supreme sacrifice on the Cross. As **prophets**, we announce the Kingdom of God in both word and deed and we witness to the Gospel in family, social life, and community, and in our commitment to human life and dignity. We share the **kingly** mission by seeking God's Kingdom of justice in the world. We do this when we overcome the kingdom of sin, give of ourselves, recognize Jesus in 'the least of these' (Mt 25:40), and work for justice and peace."

The significance of being anointed with the sacred Chrism oil at Confirmation is to further strengthen us to give off "The Aroma of Christ" (CCC 1294). The Chrism oil is mixed with fragrant spices precisely to symbolize this "aroma." Those anointed by the Spirit at Baptism and Confirmation share Christ's mission as it says in Luke 4:18-19: "*The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord.*"

To further help those newly confirmed this year, they were presented with a St. Katharine Drexel holy card (right) and a personalized letter from Fr. Mike: "As a memento of this occasion, I ask you to hold onto this letter from me to you until your 18th birthday. I have a special message for you and hope it will have even more meaning when you turn 18. It is my way of being able to communicate with you as you emerge on your next stage of life following high school. May God bless, guide, protect and keep you."


