Fifth Sunday of Lent

As we approach Holy Week, our readings speak of a God who, in the midst of death, brings new life to the people. In Ezekiel, we hear that God will open the graves of the people of Israel, who faced near extinction. In the Gospel of John, Jesus gives new life to Lazarus in a manner that prefigures the resurrection of Jesus. Paul tells the Romans that in Christ, God will not only give life to our bodies after death, but God offers us abundant life here and now. We observe that the external conditions for the people described in these readings did not radically change. Israel was still in exile. Lazarus would eventually face death again. But now God's presence and power are revealed. Even when our situation in life is difficult and perhaps not likely to change soon, we remember that the Spirit dwells within us.

EZEKIEL'S COUNTER-STORY

It is difficult to overstate the bleak situation faced by the people of Israel described in today's reading from Ezekiel. Babylon had invaded Jerusalem, killed many of its inhabitants, and destroyed the temple. Some of them were forced into exile in Babylon. Their captors and neighbors likely concluded that the Babylonian deity had pummeled the Hebrew deity into submission. Israel's God was as good as dead, and the people of Israel as well. In the midst of this catastrophe, Ezekiel announces a counter-story. The narrative of God's death is false. Israel's God is alive, and God's own breath will restore their life. They will be lifted out of the grave of their grief and despair, and be returned to their land. Ezekiel's message speaks to all of us who know of profound disorientation, of separation from loved ones, and of deep loss. God will bear our unbearable sorrow, and God's spirit will offer new life and hope.

RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE

Today's Gospel tells us of the raising of Lazarus. In Jesus' exchange with Lazarus' sister Martha, she refers to the general resurrection of the dead on "the last day." Jesus then shifts the perspective by identifying himself as "the resurrection and the life." What does this mean? Jesus earlier had spoken of the hour "when the dead will hear the voice of the Son of God, and those who hear will live" (John 5:25). When Jesus cries out in a loud voice—"Lazarus, come out!"—Jesus fulfills that role in the present, offering resurrection and life here and now, in a new relationship with him. Resurrection is offered not only on the last day, and not only at our physical death, but in the mix of our present daily lives. Sometimes we are buried in tombs of suffering or of entrapment in sin. When we encounter death in its many forms, in faith we can hear Jesus, who summons us out of death and into life.

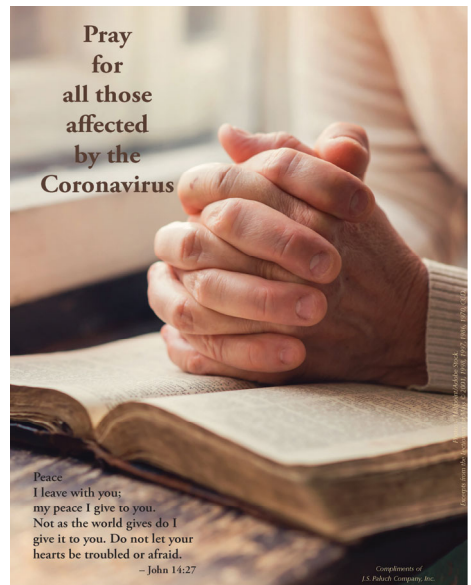

sus. Although he was their close friend, he chose to stay away, that God's glory would be manifested. This is a persistent theme in John's Gospel. As our Lenten journey reaches a crescendo, let us be mindful that, as people who have "put on Christ" in baptism, we are also called, by our attitudes and actions, to give glory to God.

As Archbishop Perez has made clear, *“the church has not closed”* and we at the parish are working to stay attentive to your needs as well as to give to our parish family ways to grow spiritually in these tough days. I want to assure you that we are here at the parish if you need us.

I want to thank you for all your support and care at this time. You have communicated your love and care so nicely. I am very proud of the way we have tried to communicate and continue to minister to the parish as a staff. I am in constant contact with the staff even though they are working from home. I asked the following of them:

1. We have made a commitment to keep each other in prayer daily and to pray for the people of the parish.
2. We have made a commitment to respond to phone calls and emails within a 24 hour window.
3. We have made a commitment to think creatively so that we can minister to you through new venues.

On our [new parish website](#) and our [Facebook and Instagram accounts](#), there are links to many helps and guides provided by the [Archdiocese of Philadelphia](#) and other sources that the parish is either doing now or will be doing in the weeks ahead. Fr. Nelson is working on livestreaming the Spanish mass from his chapel at Devon Prep. Our staff and volunteers have created on a link from our homepage to up to date information so we can keep you informed. Our worship ministers are helping plan video reflections and Sunday Homilies. Our Youth Ministry is working hard to keep the youth connected and engaging them spiritually. Our Religious Education team is sharing resources with the Caffe teachers and families and students. Outreach ministers with the 50+ group are reaching out to our seniors in the community to offer help with groceries or other needs. Our School is up and running with remote learning.

I am confident that if we work together we can be the amazing Parish that we are growing into!! Please make a commitment to private prayer and reflection. Look over our STEPS program. Once we move beyond these days, STEPS will be what we need to regather and regroup. Continue to use our website and social media to keep abreast to all the updates and developments. We may not be in our physical parish building, but your church is here to support you.

CREATE A FAMILY PRAYER SPACE AT HOME

In the coming weeks, families will be spending more time together at home. One good use of this time would be **to pray together on a regular basis**. This prayer time together can be enhanced by creating a place in your home dedicated to prayer. Making a place for prayer in our home can help us do what the Gospel tells us, to go into an “inner room” to pray (Matthew 6:6). Make your prayer place as quiet, uncluttered, and “desert-like” as possible. It can be the corner of a room or any unused space. Furnish your prayer place with a Bible, prayer books, cross, rosary, icons, and a candle. Encourage family members to use the prayer place for personal as well as family prayer. You can bless your place of prayer, saying:

***Come, Holy God. Dwell in this place of prayer,
and bless it with your peace and presence.
Bless all who seek you here.
In Jesus’ name we pray. Amen.***
